Part 1 – Can you find an article if you are given the citation?

Below are two citations to articles found in the [MHCC library](#) database (here is the [chemistry specific library site](#), <http://mhchem.org/libchem>). If you are off-campus, you will see a log-in page that asks you for your last name, MHCC ID number, and your PIN. (The default PIN is your 10-digit phone number, including the dashes.) If a username and password are required, use your MyMHCC Portal credentials.

Select "Articles" to see the Databases offered by the MHCC library. Locate the full-text (no-cost) copies of the 2 articles using the MHCC library databases and answer the following questions. Part 3 – Finding non-research or popular press resources.

In addition to peer-reviewed journal articles, some reputable science magazines in publication discuss topics in a language more suitable for the general public (i.e. – Science, Scientific America, Popular Science, Science News, New Scientist, Chemical Engineering News). Use the MHCC library or internet to find **two** sources from non-research journals with information about the topic you chose in Part 2. I recommend using the "Popular Magazines (Gale OneFile)" search engine (located under "General Databases"). Also, **view page xix-7 below for a simple APA format overview for magazine articles.**

How to Cite a Journal Article (Print or Online) in APA Format

Articles differ from book citations in that the publisher and publisher location are not included. For journal articles, these are replaced with the journal title, volume number, issue number and page number. A DOI is a "Digital Online Identifier" and should be included if available. The basic structure is:

- Article title not italicised, journal title and volume number are
- All words in journal title should be capitalised

Author surname, initial (s). (Year). Article title. *Journal Title*, Volume Number(issue or part number, optional), page numbers. DOI or Retrieved from URL

Only included if the article is online
Note: DOI is preferred

Journal Article Examples:

How to Cite Magazine Articles (Print or Online) in APA Format

The basic structure is as follows:

Author surname, initial(s). (Year, month day). Title. *Title of the Magazine*, pp.

Magazine Article Example:

Mitchell, J.A. (2017). How citation changed the research world. *The Mendeley*, pp. 26-28
